Harry and Meghan's Wedding

A very British affair

The world celebrated on the 19 May as HRH Prince Harry married Meghan Markle in a moving ceremony at St. George's Chapel, Windsor, watched by two billion people world-wide.

On the morning of the wedding, Prince Harry's grandmother, Queen Elizabeth II, conferred upon him the titles of Duke of Sussex, Earl of Dumbarton and Baron of Kilkeel. On their marriage, Meghan became known as Her Royal Highness, The Duchess of Sussex.

Prince Harry is the second son of Charles, Prince of Wales, and his late wife Princess Diana of Wales.

Harry and Meghan had been dating since June 2016. The relationship was acknowledged on 8 November 2016, when an official statement from the royal family addressing the "wave of abuse and harassment" directed toward Meghan.

On 27 November 2017, Clarence House announced that Prince Harry would marry Meghan in the spring of 2018.

Harry and Meghan were engaged in November when the young Prince gave Meghan an engagement ring made by Cleave and Company, jewellers

Clarence House is often used as a metonym for the Prince of Wales's private office, and is the Prince's Royal residence - Clarence House was previously the home to the late Queen Elizabeth the Queen's Mother.

to the Queen. It consisted of a large central diamond from Botswana, championed by two smaller diamonds from his late mother's jewellery collection. Clarence House announced that following their marriage, the newlyweds would live at Nottingham Cottage in the grounds of Kensington Palace.

The Queen consented to the couple's marriage under the Succession to the Crown Act 2013, which allows the monarch to approve or disapprove marriages of the first six persons in the line of succession. Harry was fifth in line at the time of his engagement.

Whilst Meghan attended a private Catholic school in her early years, she did not identify as a Roman Catholic. On 6 March 2018, she was baptised and confirmed into the Church of England by the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby. Under English Law Catholics cannot ascend the Throne.

The Prince of Wales (Welsh: *Tywysog Cymru*) was a title granted to princes born in Wales. The last Welsh prince, Llywelyn ap Gruffudd, was killed in battle in 1282 by Edward I, King of England, whose son also named Edward (born in Caernarfon Castle in Wales) was invested as the first English Prince of Wales in 1301. Since the 14th century, the title has been a dynastic title granted to the heir apparent to the English or British Monarchy.

Prince Charles the eldest son to Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh is the heir apparent to the British Crown and has been Duke of Cornwall and Duke of Rothesay since 1952. He is the oldest and longest-serving heir apparent in British history and as such is also the longest-serving Prince of Wales.



Diana, Princess of Wales, (1 July 1961 - 31 August 1997 The first wife of Charles Prince of Wales, and was famously referred to as "the people's princess".

Born into the aristocratic Spencer family, Diane grew up in Park House, on the Sandringham Estate, educated in England and Switzerland, her father inherited the title of Earl Spencer In 1975 and she became Lady Diana Spencer.

The couples wedding took place at St. Paul's Cathedral on 29th July 1981. The marriage produced two sons, princes William and Harry, who were second and third in line for succession to the throne. Diana was celebrated for her charity work and remained the object of worldwide media interest during and after her marriage, which ended in divorce on 28 August 1996. Media attention and public mourning were extensive after her death in a car crash in a Paris tunnel on 31 August 1997 which aroused much public scrutiny of the affairs of the Royal Family.



The only practising Catholics in Royal Family are the Kents. Duchess Katharine Kent, née Katharine Worsley b. February 22nd 1933, was accepted into the Catholic Church in January 1994, receiving personal approval from The Queen. Lord Nicholas Windsor, the couples' youngest son, also converted in 2001, and their eldest, George, married a Catholic in 1988.

Although Meghan is divorced, The Church of England no longer denies marriage to divorced persons with a living spouse.

Following the engagement, Meghan became a British

Citizen. She will retain her US citizenship during the wedding process, but Kensington Palace has indicated that the decision on whether she will retain her dual nationality has yet to be decided. Retaining U.S. citizenship is expected to create tax complications and might expose royal finances to IRS scrutiny in the USA.

The Wedding Venue

St George's Chapel was previously the venue for the weddings of Prince Harry's uncle, the Earl of Wessex, the third son of The Queen and Prince Philip. Harry's cousin, Peter Phillips son of Anne, Princess Royal, and

Third American Royal

Despite popular belief, Meghan is the third North American to marry into the Royal family (albeit the second US citizen).

The second N. American to marry into the British Royal Family, was Autumn Patricia Phillips (née Kelly, b. 3 May 1978) the wife of Peter Phillips the son of the Princess Royal, Princess Anne, and the oldest grandchild of Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip. Miss Kelly met Peter Phillips in her birthplace and hometown of Quebec and they married in St George's Chapel on 17 May 2008. She retains her Canadian citizenship.

The first American citizen to marry into the Royal Family was the renowned Wallis Simpson who married the Duke of Windsor after his abdication in 1937. Wallis became the Duchess of Windsor, but without the salutation 'Royal Highness'.

Meghan is the first person of mixed race heritage to marry into the Royal family. The engagement announcement prompted much comment about the possible social significance of Meghan becoming a proudly mixed-race royal.

her first husband, Captain Mark Phillips also married in St. George Chapel.

Cost

The royal family announced that they will pay for the wedding. The cost for the cake, the florist, and the catering have been estimated to be £446,000, the overall cost including security is expected to be around £32 million.

Security costs are expected to be lower than those of the 2011 wedding of Prince William and Kate Middleton, the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge. The Royal Borough of Windsor has reportedly spent £2.6 million on cleaning the town and roads. It has been predicted that the wedding will trigger a tourism boom and boost to the local economy of up to £500 million.

The average total spend for a UK wedding including honeymoon is estimated at £18,000

Wedding attire

The wedding dress of Meghan worn during her wedding ceremony, was replaced with a white evening dress for the wedding reception.

For months prior to the engagement, the world of would be courtiers had speculated over who would be the designer of Meghan's wedding dress. Meghan had commented on wedding dress styles in 2016, as her role character was getting married in 'Suits', she said that she preferred simple styles.

Finally the name of the designer



Clare Waight Keller of Givenchy designed the wedding dress

and maker of Meghan's simple white dress, 'Clare Waight Keller of Givenchy', was announced to the watching world when the bride to be stepped out of her limousine and entered St Georges Chapel for the wedding service. (Ms Waight Keller subsequently revealed that the Royal appointment had been kept so secret, that not even her husband had known she was commissioned to design the Royal Wedding gown that would be eventually seen by millions of people world-wide!)

The stunning gown was made from silk with three-quarter-length sleeves, an open boat neckline and a train with built-in triple silk organza underskirt. Waight Keller developed a double bonded silk caddy for the construction of the dress, which featured only six seams. The dress was without lace or any other embellishments.

The Veil

The dress was augmented by a long 5 metre (16.5-ft) veil, hand-embroidered with a variety of flowers on its hem, and symbolic crops of wheat. Markle chose two favourite flowers - wintersweet (Chimonanthus) which grows outside their Nottingham Cottage, and the California poppy (Eschscholzia californica), from where she was born - along with individual flowers representing the 53 countries of the Commonwealth, reflecting the couple's future role as Commonwealth ambassadors.

The veil was secured by a diamond bandeau tiara, made in 1932 for Queen Mary and lent to Meghan by the Queen. The centre brooch had been a wedding gift from the County of Lincoln in 1893. The tiara is a platinum band, made up of eleven sections, a detachable centre brooch with interlaced opals and diamonds. The shoes were also from Givenchy, and had a pointed couture design.

Other recherché jewellery worn by the bride included white gold and diamond earrings and a bracelet by Cartier.

Meghan's hair was rolled up with "face-framing fringe tucked behind her ears and was created by Serge Normant.

Make-up artist Daniel Martin attended Meghan's makeup for the occasion. The look was described as "a soft brown eyeshadow" with minimal makeup on the face. Her nails were painted in "neutral pinky-beige" for the ceremony.

The bride's bouquet, designed by Philippa Craddock, contained "forget-me knots, scented sweet peas, lily of the valley, astibe jasmine astrantia and

Meet Meghan Markle's Best Friend and 'Wedding Planner' Jessica Mulroney

Jessica Mulroney is married to Ben Mulroney, son of former Canadian Prime Minister Brian Mulroney

They have three children together, who make frequent appearances on her Instagram account.

She is said to have served as Meghan's "unofficial" wedding planner and reportedly flew to London in late April to help finalise Meghan's wedding plans.

Jessica was spotted in Heathrow wearing an

all-black ensemble, and even posted on Instagram implying she was traveling. While in the U.K., she was helping with final dress fittings, and attending a "mini hen party" for Meghan.

All three of her children served as Bridal Attendants in the Royal Wedding - Ivy, 4, was a bridesmaid, while her 7-year-old twins, Brian and John were page boys.

Why she didn't serve as Meghan's Maid of Honour ?

While it had been rumoured that Jessica would play a role in the wedding party, Meghan did not have a maid of honour. Rather, all of the bridal attendants were children. Royal weddings traditionally have young bridesmaids and page boys, but there might be another reason why Meghan has opted to forgo having a maid of honour. A source told royal correspondent Victoria Murphy that, "Meghan has a very close-knit group of friends and did not want to choose one over the other."

Jessica helped Meghan pick her wedding dress designer!

Jessica regularly works with brides-to-be, so it only makes sense that she'd be on-hand to help her best friend through the process. Jessica was there to help with fittings for Meghan's Givenchy dress.

And bridal expert Jessica, quietly guided Meghan through the process and then quietly flew in to London on Jan 10, spending four days at the couple's Nottingham Cottage home.

In addition to assisting with the dress, Jessica also helped "with several other wedding day elements."

According to Vanity Fair, "sources close to the Canadian stylist" revealed that Jessica was Meghan's "secret wedding planner," and had been "pulling plenty of strings behind the scenes."

Jessica is Meghan's best friend and the person Meghan trusts with helping to plan every detail," a source said. "She was the one helping Meghan to make all the key decisions. They were on the phone daily discussing every element of the wedding, from the dress to the flowers to the canapés and the photography. Meghan is very dependent on Jessica and Jessica has been totally indispensable. She's helped Meghan and Harry with so much already."

She's a Fashion Stylist

But is perhaps best known for dressing Sophie Gregoire-Trudeau, the wife of Canada's prime minister, Justin Trudeau, but the 36-year-old has had a long career in public relations and fashion design. She is also the co-founder of the 'Shoebbox Project', a non-profit organization which collects and distributes personal items for women in crisis. And while it hasn't been officially confirmed that she was Meghan's wedding planner, nobody will be surprised when that news breaks.

sprigs of myrtle. The flowers were chosen by the groom who handpicked forget-me-nots in honour of his late mother Diana, Princess of Wales.

The young bridesmaids also wore high-waist design silk dresses by Clare Waight Keller which had puff sleeves.

After the wedding the bridal bouquet was placed on the Tomb of the 'Unknown Warrior' at Westminster Abbey, following a royal tradition that began with the late Queen Mother.

Both Prince Harry and the Duke of Cambridge wore full dress uniform including frock coat of the Blues and Royals. The uniforms were made by Dege & Skinner gentleman's tailors of Saville Row, as were the clothing for the page boys - a smaller versions of the same uniform.

The groom had asked for the Queen's permission to keep his beard, (beards are only permitted under exceptional circumstances in the British Army).

Among the medals Prince Harry wore where the star of the Royal Victorian Order of which he is a Knight Commander, the ribbons of the Royal Victorian Order, and Operational Medals for Afghanistan.

His best man, Prince William, had gold aiguillettes, and wore the star of the Order of the Garter, the ribbons of the two jubilee medals, and his RAF wings.

Wedding party

There was no maid of honour (see Meghan's best friend by Alan Bennett), and the ten bridesmaids and pageboys were all children; with the bride and groom each selecting five wedding attendants. Two of Meghan's godchildren, seven-year old Rylan Ritt and her six-year-old sister Remi, as well as Brian, John and Ivy Mulroney, the three children of her friend Jessica Mulroney, were chosen by the bride - while Prince Harry chose his niece and nephew Princess Charlotte and Prince George of Cambridge, as well as his godchildren Florence van Cutsem, Zalie Warren and Jasper Dyer.

Prince Charles accompanied Meghan down the aisle, after the family confirmed her father, Thomas Markle Sr., would not be attending the wedding due to heart surgery.

Approximately 250 members of the British Armed Forces were involved in the wedding, the majority coming from units that have a connection with Prince Harry.

Wedding service

The bride spent the night before the wedding with her

mother, at the nearby, infamous Clivedon House Hotel. (Here the grand house of the socialite, Nancy Astor, was the setting for the sexual scandal known as the Profumo Affair that brought down the Macmillan Government in 1963).

Meanwhile the groom stayed at Coworth Park Hotel with his brother.

8.00 am, and the public started to arrive at the grounds at Windsor. The main congregation, the guests arrive at the chapel at 9.30 am, followed by members of the Royal Family. The Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh were the last members of the Royal Family to arrive at the chapel at 11.52 am. Shortly after, Meghan joined them with the junior attendants. She proceeded down the aisle with her entourage, where the Prince of Wales met her to escort to the altar, Prince Harry, standing, turned to Prince Charles and said, "Thank you Pa".

Then Prince Harry's maternal aunt, Baroness Fellowes, read a Bible scripture from The Song of Solomon. The Dean of Windsor, David Conner, conducted the service with the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, performing the marriage ceremony. The sermon was delivered by The Most Reverend Michael Curry, presiding bishop and primate of the Episcopal Church. The Reverend Prebendary Rose Hudson-Wilkin, and the Coptic Orthodox Archbishop of London, Anba Angaelos, offered the prayers.

The marriage vows were those published in Common Worship, and included the promise to "to love and to cherish" each other. This was sealed by the exchange of rings. The wedding rings were created by Cleave and Company, with Meghan's ring being fashioned out of Welsh gold and the Prince's ring made of platinum.

After the signing of the registers, Harry and Meghan's together with the guests sang the national anthem. The couple paused briefly to bow and curtsy to the Queen before walking down the aisle. They were followed in procession by members of the bridal party, and their families. Then to everyone's delight the couple shared a kiss on the steps outside the chapel.

Following the ceremony, there was a carriage procession through Windsor. Escorted by Mounted Cavalry of the Blues and Royals, which included comrades of Prince Harry.

Two receptions were held; the first, for those attending the ceremony, was hosted by the Queen and took place in St

George's Hall after the carriage procession.

Elton John performed for the guests and the groom and the Prince of Wales each gave a speech.

Later in the day a second reception was held at Frogmore House, for family and close friends, hosted by the Prince of Wales. Harry drove his new wife to the reception at Frogmore in a silver blue Jaguar E-Type Concept Zero, (electric propulsion, with left-hand drive).

For the evening reception, the Duchess of Sussex wore a halter-neck, open back dress by Stella McCartney and an emerald cut Aquamarine ring formerly belonging to Diana, Princess of Wales. George Northwood was her hairstylist for the private party.

In a break with tradition, the bride made a speech at the event which ended with a small fireworks displayed above Frogmore House.

The wedding cake was a layered lemon and elderflower cake and decorated with peonies in shades of white and cream. The cake designer Claire Ptak, based in London, was chosen in March 2018.

Music

Hymns sung at the wedding included Lord of All Hopefulness and Guide Me, O Thou Great Redeemer. Prince Harry was seen wiping away a tear during

the congregational singing of the latter hymn, as it was a favourite of his mother, Diana, Princess of Wales, and was also played at her funeral in 1997.

Two choirs, an orchestra and fanfare trumpeters provided music for the service. The orchestra was made up of musicians from the BBC National Orchestra of Wales, the English Chamber Orchestra and the Philharmonia Orchestra. In addition to the Choir of St George's Chapel, the Kingdom Choir, a gospel group led by Karen Gibson, sang "Stand By Me" in what was described as "an incredible and powerful moment." The State Trumpeters of the Household Cavalry, who played a fanfare, included Kate Sandford, the first female state trumpeter at a British royal wedding.

The bride walked down the aisle to "Eternal source of light divine" (from the Ode for the Birthday of Queen Anne) by Handel, sung by soprano Elin Manahan Thomas, with the trumpet obbligato performed by David Blackadder. Other music during the service included the motet "If ye love me" by Thomas Tallis; the song "Stand by Me" by Jerry Leiber, Mike Stoller and Ben E. King, arranged for choir by Mark Delisser; and "The Lord bless you and keep you" by John Rutter. During the signing of the register, 19-year-old cellist Sheku Kanneh-Mason and the orchestra played Sicilienne by Maria Theresia von Paradis, Fauré's Après un rêve, and

an arrangement for cello and orchestra of Schubert's Ave Maria. For the procession, the musicians performed the Allegro from the Symphony No. 1 in B-flat major by William Boyce and "This Little Light of Mine" by Etta James, Jester Hairston and Harry Dixon Loes.

Guests


In April 2018, it was announced that an "official list" of domestic and international political leaders was not required for the wedding and none invited. This was in contrast to the wedding of Prince Harry's elder brother, which had a large number of such guests due to his position as a future monarch.

The only politician invited was the former Prime Minister John Major as he previously was

"a special guardian on legal matters to Princes William and Harry after the death of their mother."

With a smaller ceremony and reception at St George's Hall, the guest list included approximately 600 people, most of whom have a "direct relationship" with the couple. Also, 200 close friends of the couple were invited to attend the evening reception at Frogmore House. Approximately 1,200 members of the public were invited to greet the couple outside the chapel in the grounds of Windsor Castle. The invitees outside the chapel were "people from charities, Windsor Castle community members, people from the royal households and the Crown Estate, and local school children."

The Royal Photographer, Alexi Lubomirski, is himself royalty, through the lineage of the Polish House of Lubomirski - his official title is His Serene Highness Prince Alexi Lubomirski. He also took the Royal couple's official engagement photos last year. However, the Duchess of York was not invited to the evening reception at Frogmore House hosted by Prince Charles and was reportedly "deeply upset" by her omission.

As royal biographer Duncan Larcombe told Harper's Bazaar, "These portraits cement Harry and Meghan's place at the heart of the royal family."

"Meghan's mum is seen standing next to her daughter and beaming with pride after a wedding that ripped up the rule book," Larcombe continued. "Even the Queen seems uncharacteristically relaxed as she and the 96-year-old Duke of Edinburgh are joined by three generations of their family." Larcombe also shared that where everyone is placed in the portrait is significant. Prince William and Duchess Kate, for example, were moved over to the bride's side so the portrait would look more even. The Duchess is also likely sitting because she gave birth just a few weeks ago.

+Harry's brother in arms (and the heart)

During their cavalcade through Windsor after their wedding, Harry might have glance for a moment at the horseman in the shiny boots and plumed helmet just in front of him (Valentine Low PA writes). It was Frankie O'Leary, his old radio operator from their theatre of war in Afghanistan. Honored to be serving his former comrade, there is no doubt that Corporal of Horse (sergeant) O'Leary approves of the match: in his words, 'Harry has pulled a cracker!'



However, the comrades in arms are more than just former soldiers who once shared a battlefield: for when Corporal O'Leary, 31, took part in the Household Cavalry escort for the Carriage procession he, 'romantically speaking', returned a favour that Harry did for him when they served together. As Corporal O'Leary recalled, it was when they were stationed in Windsor that Harry went out of his way to help him.

"Harry had seen me walking with a young lady, unbeknownst to me he was driving on his own, no security detail, just going for a spin, like you do as an English prince. All of a sudden the Prince slowed down his car and wound the window down and said, "See you later, Frank."

I was like, "See you later, sir." I carried on walking. The young lady was stunned - she stood shocked - a few steps behind me, with her mouth wide open and said,

"Was that...it was... wasn't it?" she managed to utter. I just played it cool. "Of course it was. Happens all the time!" What Harry did, seemed to have had the right effect on the young woman, a Swede called Niina. "She became my wife," Corporal O'Leary said

One of the 24 soldiers and two officers who made up the Royal couple's escort, he is naturally delighted and proud to have been part of Harry and Meghan's Royal military escort.

"It was wonderful, Its Britain isn't it? There were flags, horses, men in armour, solders in big furry hats, drums beating, and an historic castle. No one does it better than this little island!" Then recalling Harry as a very good officer, a man of courage, a man of honour when he was a forward air controller in Afghanistan ten years ago, Corporal O'Leary said, he looks "very happy now.
